# At the Last Meeting

Contrary to our usual policy of lengthy discussion and little decision, the business meeting of March 22 netted tangible results. The questionnaire, which had been drawn up in tentative form by a special committee, was read twice by Paul Bradt. There followed a Withering discussion which seemed likely to doom the Committee's efforts. However, with minor modifications the questionnaire was finally approved for sending out as a ballot to all members. Questionnaire recipients will vote on proposals to limit voting membership to those who have climbed one qualifying climb (A or B) in the last calendar year, and to those (for members elected in the future only) who are Trail Club members.

Prodded by Cliff Proctor, the members present declared themselves a quorum and, after striking out three climbs, unanimously approved the new list of additional qualifying climbs which have been discussed at previous meetings.

Following Mrs. Simons' generous refreshments, the group dispersed well satisfied because something had been accomplished. All sympathized with Don Hubbard. Don fears that his voting days Will soon be over, since the one climb he can make is too hazardous

to be included on the list.


