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THE SMOKE HOLE THANKSGIVING TRIP By Paul Bradt

W shington Rock Climbers have probably spent between 50 and 100 days climbing on the west slopes of North Fork mountain, on Seneca, Champe, and Nelson Rocks, and in Schoolhouse and Hellhole caves. The east side of that mountain has also rocks and caves, but they have been over there only once to climb. At that time four rope teams scrambled all over Eagle Rock. That was at the south end of the Smoke Hole, as the valley is called, where cars can be driven.

As the valley is followed northward one continually passes tempting rocks, both along the road and beyond the range of cars. Among the notable cliffs are Blue Rock and Green Spring Rock, toward the north end. These are by far the largest limestone masses anywhere near here. Blue Rock, apparently somewhat the smaller but more accessible of these two, received the attention of the Mountain Troops. They did some road grading to get jeeps in there for instruction purposes.

in there for instruction purposes. With the idea that I can use instruction too, I proposed a trip down there for the Thanksgiving week end. Our Chairman asked me to lead it as a scheduled Club trip. A camp site (see accompanying map) has been selected near good water and climbing. The Dark Horse (alias Sink Stopper No. 1) will be on hand for ferrying purposes. A cave will be available if the outdoor weather is too bad.

To reach the camp site leave Petersburg, West Virginia, on State Road 4. At 6.8 miles from Petersburg, turn left across the bridge onto the Smoke Hole fire road. Up this road 2.5 miles, at the very tip of a meander, turn left to Mr. Rohrbach's farm, where cars will be left. In following Mr. Rohrbach's drive, turn right through a gate and immediately left. The barnyard is just below. Caution: Cars cannot safely be left on the fire road. Food, tent and bedding will have to be backpacked along an old road and down a hill to the camp site near the sawmill at Redman Run. There is good climbing at Redman Gap and at neighboring gaps.

I will be there before noon Thursday and plan to stay at the same camp site until Sunday. Those who remember previous Thanksgiving trips will wear enough clothing.
