

April 8, 1951. Win Lembeck, Peg Keister and Elisabeth Buck left all encumbrances behind and journeyed to Sperryville to join a group of MCM hikers originally bound for Little Devil's Stairs. Wet weather changed their plans, but they had a good, though soggy, hike in the Piney Branch Trail region. On the last lap of their circuit hike, they met Paul Bradt and Chris Scoredos, with a large group of FATC trail workers, enthusiastically hacking at seme huge blow-downs. The three hikers joined the work crew at dinner in Warrenton, before checking up on the survivors of the above trip at the Lembecks.

April 14-15, 1951. Little Stony Man Mountain.

The first carload (Arnold, Art, Jim, Peg and Wayne) arrived at Little Stony Man about 2 P.M. Saturday. Without delay, Arneld led his party up Arneld's Climb, while Art and Jim went up a drafty chimney. After another climb or two, they headed for Hawksbill Leanto, to find that the Goldman's were already encamped. fore we were fully parked, Charlie dreve up with Henrich and Sam.

Shortly thereafter, chow was in the making, ranging from beef stew to steaks and fried chicken. Well filled, we settled down before the fire for awhile before

turning in.

Sunday merning Sam endeared himself to all by chopping wood at 6 A.M. Ray and Tony arrived about 8, and the climbing party got under way by 9. The Goldmans and Henrich chose to hike. The others, shortly joined by Al and Bob, were soen flapping in the 60-mile gale that swept the exposed cliffs. Tony and Ray pieneered a couple of routes fit only for lizards. Arneld led a piton-recovery trip up the chimney climbed previously by Art and Jim.

For these who have not been there, Little Steny Man is a large outcrop of granodiorite about 100 high. The west face is nearly vertical, everhangs in spots, with routes of varying degrees of difficulty. Quite a bit of loose rock requires

careful testing of all holds and affords doubtful piton cracks.

Along about 5, thoroughly blown, we called it a day. The traditional steak dinner at Warrenton Coffee Shoppe wound up the weekend's activities.

Felix reports that they turned off Route 240 north on Md. 75 at Hyattstown, continued through New Market and some 2 to 3 miles north of New London lecated the eutcrop. The rocks are 40 to 50 ft. high and permitted 5th class ascents requiring several pitons. Overhangs provided opportunity for Prusik practice.

From the American Alpine Club News: "The Houston party to Eastern Nepal has returned. Mr. Oscar R. Houston, who organized and planned the trip, Mrs. Elizabeth Cowles, Anderson Bakewell, who is now at St. Mary's College, near Darjeeling, and Major H.W. Tilman and Dr. Charles S. Houston made up the party which was the first to enter this area. They traveled 150 miles to the south face of Everest, and Major Tilman and Dr. Houston spent one week examining and photographing the climbing possibilities of the south side of Everest. They were unable to find a practicable route and report that the south side is far more broken, steeper, and apparently more difficult than the conventional north side approach."

From Mountaineering I, 9, Feb. 1951, we learn that one member, P. Kvernberg, of a party of an Anglo-Norwegian expedition made a first ascent of Tirich Mir (25263) which is in the Hindu Kusch on the India-Afghanistan border. They climbed in August, last year.

Also "On 6 May 1950 a German party consisting of Hans Ertl and Gert Schroeder made a first ascent of the North Peak of Illimani (21260) in the Belivian Andes. Several agents of the Middle Peak (ca. 20000) were made by other parties this year."

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Stan Themas has sent us word of a series of guided climbs to be conducted this summer by French guides through the good offices of the British Mountaineering Council. The climbs will take place at various centers in the Alps and Pyrennes from 3 June to 29 September. The fees are low - once you are on the spot. Call Stan (DE 9608) for details if you plan a trip over there.
