Mountaineering Committee Activities During 1952

No serious accidents occurred on any of these trips.

The total number of ascents of climbs classified as A's in the latest list (UP ROPE, vol. VIII, No. 18, 11 Feb., 1952) was 68. This list is probably very much abbreviated because a large number of ascents of such climbs as the Spiderwalk, the Cross-Over, etc., are never reported. However, I'm pretty sure that all climbs of the Big Toe Traverse, Donald's Ducks, and Charlie's Crack were recorded. The breakdown of these ascents is as follows:
