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Although by this time it is no longer news, we feel that the recent first ascent of Everest by two climbers of the British party headed by Col. John Hunt deserves mention. The world's highest mountain has been the target of a number of attempts for the past thirty years, and will no doubt be the target of many more, but this first successful ascent by Sherpa Tribesman Bhotia Tensing and Edmund Hillary of New Zealand on May 29th will probably go down in history as the climax of the era of primary ascents.

The movie makers returned to Carderock for probably the last time, to fill in some training sequences with Oscar. Johnnie went out a little early to set up Oscar's rigging, so the filming went along fairly rapidly and was completed shortly after lunch. A number of relative newcomers got a chance to practice their dynamic belaying after the filming was finished.

There was some climbing activity in addition to the filming; there were two fairly spectacular feats - Marion Harvey did Herbie's Horror, and Bill Youden went up the Spiderwalk twice. Frank Sauber did Jan's Face, and two newcomers did well for themselves; Alice Hallinan did the Beginner's Crack, and Terry Hallinan did both the Barnacle Face and Ronnie's Leap.

After the completion of the filming, some of the group moved down to the vicinity of the ChrisWcxDon. Out of numerous attempts, only Johnnie Reed did Leonard's Lunacy, and Earl Reed did the Key Climb.

Glimbing was followed by dinner at Frank Sauber's place, for which Earl demostrated a phenomenal talent for selecting superb steaks, and Arnold again proved his abilities as chef.

Seneca Rock this weekend was host to a distinguished visitor from the A.M.C. of N.Y., Hans Krause, who came down on Arnold's invitation. By coincidence, another party of Washington climbers was at Seneca as the result of a white-water boating trip which aborted for lack of water.

On Saturday, both groups climbed on Seneca, with Hans Krause leading the Wexler group on a skyline traverse - up the SE corner to the ridge, then over the Old Man's route and the Cockscomb to the South Peak. From there, they went down to the Gunsight, climbed the Gendarme, and climbed up to the North Peak. The Moore Group, arriving late, did a series of easy pitches on the west face up to a part of the southern skyline, then came down the east face.

Sunday, Arnold's party, except Joan, went down to Melson Rock, where they climbed the NE ridge, encountering a bit of loose rock in the process. The thinness of the ridge and its fragile character suggested a brittle razors edge. They rappeled down the northern end. The rest of the climbers meanwhile did a series of pitches on Seneca Rock, except for Bill and Gerry, who went down the North Fork in Ray's rubber boat as far as Champ Rock.

The Mountaineering Committee was host to some Social Climbers from Pittsburgh this weekend. The Pittsburghers heard so much of the local Washington climbing that they had to see it for themselves.

Arriving Saturday morning, the climbers went out to Carderock where they spent most of their time belaying Oscar. Some climbing was done: the Beginner's Crack, Ronnie's Leap, Jan's Face, and the ChrisWexDon.

Saturday evening, a sizable group gathered at the Buck's for a showing of Arnold's color slides of the Monashees. Because of rain, the Pittsburghers sacked out there, also.

Sunday was overcast, but there was no rain, so the climbers went to Great Falls, Md. The climbing began as usual with the Red Overhang and the Sturgeon's Struggle. The former was done by Earl Reed, Ray, Earl Mosburg, and Tony, and the latter by Earl Reed, Walt, Sayre, Ray, Frank and Gerry, with Arnold and Tony doing a tricky variation of it.

Immediately upstream of the rock formation on which is Pog's Progress; there is a second rock mass with an impressive northern face which was the next scone of activity. The face was done by Pog (under protest, with considerable impetus from the rear supplied by Tony and Johnnie), Arnold, Bill Kemper, Tony, Jane, and Gerry, with Tom and Ray doing the adjacent inside corner. The western face of the same rock was done by Earl Reed, Arnold, Johnnie, and Frank Sauber.

The Little Handhold That Isn't There was the next recipient of activity, with only Ray and Tony managing to make it. Cliff, Johnnie, Shirley, and Sayre did a nearby traverse with Johnnie giving his belayers, Cliff and Shirley, a chance to demonstrate their ability with a dynamic belay, by falling off unexpectedly on purpose.

After lunch, everyone sat around cheering Earl Reed, Jane and Walt on an attempt on Peg's Progress - seems that Earl, who was leading, had in mind a near impossible variation. They eventually completed it the usual way. The Great Falls Bulge was then given a working over by practically everyone, but no one made it.

Some of the folks followed up the climbing with dinner at the Buck's, with Earl Reed selecting the steaks and Arnold as chef - they make a good team.
