The Treasurer reported a balance in the treasury of \$76.42. It was agreed that this sum would be held pending the purchase of a mechanical device to be used in hoisting Oscar for belay practice.

Miss Showacre, Chairman of the Film Committee, announced that the script for the movies is in preparation and will soon be ready.

Announcement was made that Peg Keister had resigned as Business Manager. John Christian is the new editor of UP ROPE.

Report of the Chairman of the Mountaineering Committee - 1954

From New Years Day 1954 to New Years Day 1955, the members of the Mountaineering Committee continued their weekly climbing trips, to nearby rocks on Sund eys, and to more distant climbing areas on longer weekends. Attend ance of 761 participants was recorded on one day trips and 273 on two and three day trips a grand total of 1,034. In addition, there was a large number of participants on trops which were unrecorded, including 3 well attended trips to Seneca Rocks. A detailed breakdown of climbing areas visited and recorded attendance follows.

At least 25 of our climbers were reported to be participants in mountaineering expeditions in various areas in the western United States and Canada during 1954. An innovation in our regular Sunday schedule this year was a scheduled hike along the Virginia side of the Potomac River from Great Falis to Chain Bridge. Four cave trips were scheduled.

Instruction in techniques required for climbing safety has continued and a large number of beginners have been taught the elemtentary principles of climbing. In addition some effort has been made toward the development of new rope leaders. On one occassion during the year we were visited by the Pittsburgh Climbers, who made use of our facilities at Carderock for practicing dynamic belaying. On another occasion a climber from Philidelphia visited for the purpose of practicing with us. The chairman has given some consideration to proposals for rigging a mechanical hoist for the durny used for belay practice, but has been unable to formulate any practical scheme. The publication of Uo Rope as the official record of the activities of the Mountaineering Committee continued during the year with Johnny Reed as editor and Peg Keister as business manager.

Work on our movie on dynamic belaying progressed at a very slow rate during the year, with writing of sreipt to accompany the film. Titling and final editing of the film and script remain to be accomplished, Our previous climbing film has been made available on Several occasions during the year for showing to other climbing organizations.

Our safety record was marred this year by a fall from the cliffs at Canderock, in which a beginner suffered a rather serious foot injury requiring his hospitalization for over two weeks. Arnold Wexler has been appointed chairman of a committee of three which will submit a detailed report on the accident.

In addition, there were three scheduled trips to Seneca Rocks, a December cave trip, a New Year's trip to Pocosin shelter with climbing at Old Rag and Stony Man, and one trip each to Sugarloaf, Echo Cliffs, and Great Falls, Md. which were not reported in UP ROPE. And four lost weekends. The total of 55 trips is accounted for by the fact that that on three weekends there were two activities underway.

(*Weekends on which no trips were scheduled, and no report was made to either the Chairman or to the Editor of UP ROPE on the days' activities.)

PLANNING COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

Present at PATC HQ, February 3, 1955: Jane Showacre (Chm.), Paul Bradt, Joan and Phil Cardon, John Christian, Ken and Pim Karcher, Peg Kiester, and Arnold Wexler.

Chairman Showacre stated the purpose of the meeting as: to plan for weekend trips and schedule Sunday climbing through the end of June, and to discuss programs for monthly meetings.

Suggestions and Discussions: Joan Cardon, speaking for Andy Kaufffman, recommended that we schedule more overnight weekend trips and that when trips for one day of great distance are scheduled, it would be advisable to meet at the destination and have someone (i.e. the leader) arrange for transportation, etc. (See later) This would eliminate the meeting at the Hot Shoppe.

Paul Bradt came up with the suggestion that for long one day trips and for week-end trips an assistant leader be appointed. This would a llow for either the leader or assistant to go to the Hot Shoppe and meet with any people who did not know the destination and make armangaments for their getting to the climbing area. Suggestion adopted. John Christian recommended that we utilize "new blood" as assistant leaders so that they can gain experience in handling arrangements and also assume some responsibility; also acquaint them with climbing areas which are not frequently visited on organized trips.

Arnold Wexler requested that from time to time we publish in UP Rope that telephone calls must not be made to the Hot Shoppe. Also that people who come into the Hot Shoppe either sit down or wait outside. Keep out of the aisle.

Jane Showacre will ask Frank Sauber to serve as representative of the Mountaineering Committee with the PATC Equipment Committee.

Jane Showacre announced that Dr. Welsh is going to work up a First Aid course in conjunction with Dr. Cardon for instruction of the rock climbers. At the present time, Andy Kauffman is taking a comprehensive course in First Aid and is interested in this phase.

Peg Keister will assume responsibility to reserve shelters IF she is going on the trips; otherwise she will contact the leader to have him reserve the shelter so that the shelter is reserved in the name of someone who will be going.

Arnold Wexler recommended that at future meetings we get into round table type discussions concerning the thehnical aspects of rock climbing and mountaineering. These discussions to cover belaying an d rope work in mountaineering and the preparation for trips, snow and ice work. He recommended High Altitude Physiology as an interesting subject for a future meeting. Dr. Phil Cardon volunteered to discuss that subject before the group some time in late 55. Arhold Wexler will present a discussion as a continuation and discussion of Siri's article. It was suggested that Andy Kauffman would be interested in discussing the snow and ice techniques.

Jane Showacre announced that Dr. Bill Welsh had volunteered to serve as Business Manager of UP ROPE.

Report of Special Investigating Committee. Arnold Wexler turned over the report to the Chairman with the collection of statements he received from the climbers and the witnesses as well as exhibits (1) the bolt which failed and (2) experimental specimen bolts and (3) pictures of the accident taken by Dr. Welsh. The pictures are to be returned when they have served their purpose. Arnold stated that a short version of the report (situation, cause, etc.) would be submitted to the American Alpine Club for publication.

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Chairman Jane Showacre will determine disposition of Report and Work with Arnold on report to be submitted to AAC.
