DRIVING DIRECTIONS: Standard N.Y. route to Exit 10 on New Jersey Turnpike; Garden State Parkway to end; N.J. US 17 North to Harriman interchange; off Thruway and left (west) on N.Y. 299; continue to end of road and US 44; turn right on US 44 past switchback and over pass in mountain; continue approximately two miles past the pass to white painted concrete culvert to campground immediately off road. (This is first large culvert you pass.)

THE CLIMBING AREAS ALONG THE POTOMAC

CARDEROCK and HERZOG ISIAND: Maryland

Park on the canal side of McArthur Blvd., beyond the Model Basin and Brick Yard Road. Walk downstream on towpath to trail which turns off on flat area. Herzog Island may be reached by wading across at low water.

CAMP LEWIS: Maryland

Drive one mile past Cabin John Bridge and turn left on Wilson Ave. Park next to the canal and walk up the tow path.

CUPIDS BOWER: Maryland

Park on canal side of McArthur Blvd. at Anglers Inn. Walk up stream, where you can cross when the water is low.

SPITZBERGEN: Maryland

Park as for Cupids Bower and walk up stream past Wide Water and turn left after crossing bridge. The PURPLE HORSE, not listed, is just below Spitzbergen.

PEG'S PROGRESS AND CLEFT ISLAND: Maryland

Park at the Great Falls parking lot. Walk down stream.

EAGLE AND BOUCHER ROCK: Virginia

Cross Chain Bridge and turn right (1st turn) on Leesburg road. Park at Swinks Mill.

ECHO CLIFFS AND POTHOLES: Virginia

Park just above (up stream) Difficult Run at chained dirt road on right. Take first turn off to right and follow cliff side trail.

CORKSCREW: Virginia

Same as above, only walk on road to river and turn left.

RINGBOLT, JULIETS BALCONY, CORKSCREW: Virginia

Park at Great Falls (a small fee is charged) or at the spot listed for Echo Cliffs.
