Seneca Rocks, West Virginia--Labor Day Weekend

The Mountaineering Committee used the Labor Day weekend to advantage and staged a three-day camping-climbing trip to Seneca Rocks. Many new members who had not climbed at Seneca before attended and for them the Rocks offered a new and exciting experience. Although those arriving on Friday were met with rain, the next three days offered perfect climbing weather. Each morning, after several hours of organizing, the group broke up into small parties and attempted most of the standard routes. Dave Warshawsky and Chris Buckingham both led for their first time on the rocks while Joe Faint and Joe Molte attempted several new routes to the summit. For those finishing their climbs early, there was time for a short swim in the creek. Several deviationists took advantage of this opportunity to practice water rescue techniques with Mary Turk. On Saturday evening a hungry group of climbers enjoyed a

delicious church supper at Riverton. A near accident on the Tony's Nightmare route occurred on Monday morning which emphasized the advantages of 7/16" rope. The third climber on a rope of four fell off and nearly two strands of his belay rope -- 3/8" rope -- were cut on a sharp projection of rock. During Monday afternoon there were reports of Bill Allnutt practicing rappelling and prusiking on the south end of Seneca Rocks, and as many were leaving, the chairman led a party up the Old Ladies' route to place a new register book at the summit.
