### February 1987 The meeting began with a brief summary of upcoming events. Stuart Pregnall spoke on the advantages and necessity of increasing our membership. Many climbers are unaware of the legal decisions being made concerning access or use of climbing areas. With a larger membership, the MS--in conjunction with other clubs-can have a greater influence in land use and preservation decisions. At the Executive Meeting held at the Pregnalls, the possibility was discussed of requiring people who participate in our training sessions to become members or pay for the instruction. Rich Cunningham entertained us with slides of his ascent of Mt. McKinley last summer.

### HANGING AROUND

Camp Lewis, MD. March 21, 1987. Camp Lewis includes the rocks directly opposite Boucher Rocks, just next to I-495 on the Maryland side. From Carderock we walked downstream

along the canal to the first spillway, just about where the large Navy building end (on the left). We turned right and followed the small stream until we had to ford a built spillway. The rocks can be approached either by exiting left or right towards the None of the rocks river. immediately across from this spillway were rigged. Guided by Barb Llewellyn and a copy of the Vol.2, No. 15, 1945 UpRope. we rigged several climbs. Facing the rocks, from left to right on the "Dome" or "Skull" we climbed the thin , awkward face (5.8), the nose and two variations, thanks to Tom Isaacson (5.9, 5.10). Also climbed the Ferocious Layback either as a layback (5.9), ro using the pinnacle (5.7), the 5.8 route up the corner, and then a face, and attempted the bottom moves of Shaefer's Aching Back (Aid).

Moving downstream we climbed Pony Express (5.6), the ramp/corners which are part of Crawford's Crash and Lizards Ledge. The Short Man's Climb is essentially a short climber's boulder problem to climb the square rock just to the left of the Jam Crack.

The Jam Crack (5.8) like all the these routes does not look too difficult unitl it is attempted. On the Main Cliffs. the set of rocks separated from the upstream ones by the Beginner's Notch, we climbed the West Sentinel (5.3), the Junior Horror left (5.4), and right (5.7). None of the East Face climbs were rigged due to the brambles. Stuart Rosenthal suggested we rig a climb on a large block, 30 ft. high upstream from the Dome (5.9ish).

"Dear Ian:

Hope all is well with you and the gang at the club and in Can't recall where I was D.C. when I wrote you last so I'll generally bring you up to date. I've now completed 22 countries. They include the U.S.A., Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Panama, Columbia, Ecuador, and Peru to Lima. From there I went to Iquitas and took a number of boats 3,500 miles down the Amazon to Belem, Brazil. When in Ecuador, I went to Lago [ "where the recent earthquake damage was the most severe", then to Coca, the last city before the jungle. Then I took small boats to the sidputed border between Ecuador and Peru. In R---, I met some Auca Indians (the ones with the huge earlobes). I spent some time with them in the jungle and although I was on malaria medication, I managed to get it. The cure is to take heavy

doses of the preventative medicine. The result was that in Belem Brazil, I was getting Thus I some side effects. needed to go someplace where I could get off the meds. I flew to Luxembourg. In Europe I've covered England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Holland, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, France and Spain. A little more time in Spain, perhaps, France and then Scandinavia. After that, either Africa, north to south, or Austria, Yugoslavia, Greece, Turkey and somehow on to Pakistan and India. I anticipate three to four more years to finish. I've extended the time as I've decided to tour much more extenmsively than originally planned. I'm finding the experience a great education. I've had some unusual experiences and hope to be able to write about the trip when I've finished.

I'd like to hear from you some time again. Are the troops in D.C. still climbing, etc. Well. enough for now. Hello to club and troops."

### REVIEWS

In The Throne of the Mountain Gods. By Galen Rowell, 1986 paperback reprint. Sierra Club Books, \$17.95. 326 pp.

If you've got a good but not great book, then how can you justify reprinting and charging \$17.95 for it? Well, if the book is one of Galen Rowell's, and he has lots of fabulous transparencies that didn't make it into the original artwork for the first publication, then you can get away with it and not feel ashamed.

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Climbers will remember the group of dissidents who fought their way into the Baltoro region to attempt an American ascent of K2 in 1975. Rowell's book chronicled the events that led up to the expedition and the factors that prevented its success, and made a sort of instant hit eith climbers who wanted to peer into the sordid details of why expeditions fail. Behind the glitz, however, lay a deeper tale: one of human accomplishment over the years that the region has been inhabited. This book, furst published in 1976, opened Rowell's awareness of the magnificence of the geological and human resources that make Karakoram such а the fascinating region. He has

since returned many times. The reprint of <u>In the</u> Throne Room contains many new photographs, some of which are stunning. If you're into collecting books, then you'll have to pick this one up. But if you just like Rowell's work, a far better value is his new Mountain Light, which at twice the price has more pics and tells you how he managed to take them. Of course, if you don't already have a copy of Thr<u>one Room</u>, then you should buy it--some day we may all have the chance to qo expeditioneering, and there are some valuable lessons to be learned by reading it.
