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LETTER FROM THE PAST CHAIRPERSON

Dear Members:

As outgoing chairperson, I'd like to make a few observations about the Mountaineering Section, aka "The Club", over the past several years. These years have been good ones the membership has remained strong, around 200. Just when we are saddened by some of our closest friends and strongest supporters in the Club moving away to new lands -Vancouver, Aspen, Paris, Boston, Zimbabwe, Phoenix, Brasilia (at least they're moving to interesting places) we find that enthusiastic new faces keep appearing at our functions, and so we make new friends. The thing that has always struck me about the club is the diversity of its members and their interests. One can attend club functions and meet stimulating people from all over the world in many different fields (although an informal poll shows that science predominates).

The long traditions and mainstays of the club activities remain strong - the invariable Wednesday monthly meeting and slide shows, the potluck dinner executive committee meetings (although this club isn't known for its culinary talents), the Saturday and Sunday top-roping trips, weekends lead-climbing at the Gunks and Seneca Rocks, but most of all, the easy ribaldry, camaraderie, and support of fellow climbers having a good time. UPROPE keeps providing the glue to make us a club. We painted the Nelson House; we did maintenance at Carderock; and we continued to pursue our rights to climb at Bull Run. We brought wellknown climbers to Washington to share their adventures with us: Lynn Hill, Glenn Porzak, Mark Wilford, and the Paul Piana non-slide show. Our parent club, PATC, continues to provide comfortable logistical support and the credibility of its membership of over 4,000 people and a 60-year history.

Some innovations have gradually insinuated themselves. however. We now climb at Great Falls more than Carderock; we go to the New River Gorge as well as to Seneca and the Gunks: we have a social hour at the monthly meetings with pizza and beer; more of us work out intensively for climbing, climb on artificial walls, and enter sport climbing competitions: we wear Lycra and Gore-tex instead of wool knickers and painters' pants; club business gets done by telephone answering machine. Maybe next year PATC will realize its plans to move from Dupont Circle to the suburbs. Surely the club will survive even that.

Some new club activities merit comment. The film festival, now in its third year after two highly successful festivals, grew out of the brainstorming of Madeleine Carter and Ken Andrasko. Both Madeleine and Ken have brought the club new vision and ideas and the confidence that we can do anything we set our minds to. Although some of us eventually have questioned (after burnout) whether the film festival is the best use of the club's energies, of which it takes a considerable amount, the festival now seems somewhat entrenched and is certainly popular

with the club members and the community. Another new activity is the formation of a Climbing Wall Committee, headed by Tom Haliki, which we hope will bring us great things in the future. A revitalized activity, which I cannot praise highly enough, is the Expeditions Committee, rejuvenated by Tim Hood. Tim has organized a climbing trip to New Hampshire this winter and to the Tetons this summer. Researching, organizing and participating in such trips to climb with like-minded friends in far away places is, to me, the essence of why many of us joined the club in the first place.

Specifically, I would like to thank the many individuals who have recently contributed a great deal to the club and who made being an officer rewarding over the past two years: John Yanson, forever cheerful and the possessor of illustrative talents, who I know will do a great job as chairperson this year (besides, he lives close enough to PATC to put the beer in the refrigerator before meetings); Jeff Kramer, quiet and competent balancer of the books (leaving a nice surplus), and provider of trip leadership on the coldest of days (when yours truly is still in the feathers); Tom Isaacson, workout freak and welcome ear for trials and tribulations and a constant source of good judgment and wisdom who manages to keep UPROPE appearing in spite of all odds; Jeffrey Levy, wry wit and enthusiastic volunteer for a multitude of tasks that actually appear to get done; Michael Mergi, the

backbone of UPROPE who has done lots of licking and stamping and delivering to the Merrifield post office; Doug Craun, painter and prodigious purveyor of pizza and beer; Pete Grant, race car driver and trainer of scores of new climbers: Madeleine Carter, filmmaker who brought us many enjoyable films and slide shows as monthly programs, who instituted the film festival and whose presence in DC is sorely missed; Clair Ganz, bringing us new monthly slide shows and more film festival tickets than we can ever sell; Tim Hood, proud father who single-handedly restarted the tradition of club expeditions to far places; Tom Kawecki, home renovator who finds time to handle the publicity for our many programs; Selma Hanel, a club historian and tireless editor soon to bring us the Carderock guidebook: Ken Andrasko, world traveler who inspired the first film festival and thinks up new ideas faster than we can absorb them; Anne Baron, French translator extraordinary with a larger vocabulary in English than most climbers; Stuart and Karen Pregnall, Rich Cunningham, Tom Russell, Ed Cummings, Charlie Dorian, those past officers whom I could always count on for some sage advice; and Lee Collyer, PATC staff manager, who eases the logistics of organization.

Endearing the Club to me in a very basic way is the Club's longstanding support for women both as climbers and as leaders of the club. This equality and tolerance appears to stretch back to times when such support could not be taken for granted in our institutions and clubs, particularly in sports. The long tradition of women's involvement in the club started at least in 1944 when Jan Conn helped start UPROPE and pioneered many routes in this area. Women's involvement continued through the chairpersonships of Margaret Wettling, Sallie Greenwood, Dorothy Martin, Martha Hale and yours truly. Many contributions to strong climbing and club organization have been made in recent memory by Selma Hanel, Madeleine Carter, Karen Pregnall, Sue Hartley, Nori Gessler, Clair Witt, Anne Baron, Clair Ganz, Helen Grant, Marcy Logan, Barbara McLlewellyn, Kathy Rebibo, Kit Pollok, Lynn Murphy,

June Lehman, Elizabeth Vos, Blondie Worrell, and many others.

FRENCH FILMMAKER TO ATTEND FILM FESTIVAL

French mountaineer and filmmaker Marc Batard is planning to attend the Third Annual Washington Mountain Film Festival on March 15, 1990, for the showing of his film "Le Sprinter de l'Everest". On September 26, 1988, Marc achieved the amazing feat of climbing Mt. Everest (8,848 meters) in 22 hours and 30 minutes without oxygen. Marc attained the summit on his third attempt with the assistance of Sherpa climbers breaking trail and setting up two camps on the mountain. His exploits are set out in his film and book of the same name with the collaboration of Brigitte Logeart. His further exploits include the first solo ascent of the west pillar of Makalu (8,481 meters) in 18 hours and his ascent of Cho Oyu (8,200 meters) in 19 hours in 1988. A veteran of many other Himalayan and Alpine climbs, he is a well-known mountaineer in France and has received several awards for his adventures. Marc is a 36-year old mountain guide from Megeve in the French Alps, where he lives with wife and three children. In Washington, he will be the guest of the Mountaineering Section and will meet with various journalists, mountaineers and club members. BRIEF HISTORY OF MOUNTAINEERING SECTION AND UPROPE

The Mountaineering Section of PATC has existed in spirit since the 1920's, although the organization began under a different name. Under the leadership and enthusiasm for exploration and climbing by Gustave Gambs, rock climbing became popular in the Great Falls area. The cliffs were frequented for weekend outings by a group called the Washington

Rock Climbers. They recorded their adventures in the newsletter UPROPE which was founded in 19 by Herb an Jan Conn. In 1950, the Washington Rock Climbers joined PATC and became the Mountaineering Committee and UPROPE became the club newsletter. The group changed its name in 1965 to the Mountaineering Section of PATC. From 1944 to the present, UPROPE has continued to report trips to local climbing areas, anecdotes of first ascents, names of new routes, vignettes of members' adventures and expeditions to other rock climbing and mountaineering areas in the United States and around the world.


ELECTIONS HELD

- RR = Roy Rogers Restaurant, 465 N. Fredrick Rd, Gaithersburg, MD. DIR: Exit I-270 at exit Rt. 124 E. (Montgomery Village Ave.); R. on Rt. 355 S. (Fredrick Rd); L. at second light, U-turn into parking lot behind restaurant.
- TC = Tysons Corner. Hardee's Restaurant and Central Fidelity Bank Parking Lot. 8111 Leesburg Pike, Vienna.

 Va. DIR: Exit I-495 at Rt.7 W. (Tysons Corners): L. at second light into bank lot.
- AO = Appalachian Outfitters, 2930 Chain Bridge Rd., Oakton, VA. DIR: Exit I-66 at exit 16 (Rt. 123 N); L.just past fourth light (AO is on your left) into shopping center, go to far left into bank parking lot closest to AO store.
